PROJECTS

We are continuing with work on the South Pennine Watersheds Project. This year our task is to produce some interpretation material for three places for which Site Management Plans have already been written. These are Gorpley Clough near Todmorden, March Haigh and Buckstones near Marsden and Penistone Hill, near Haworth. Each will have some geological material, perhaps leaflets, interpretation boards or audio trails available on websites. We will write some geology material for the National Trust display area in Marsden and produce some teaching material for schools. Any volunteers to help with this work will be very welcome.

Site management plans for Ogden Water near Halifax, Baildon Hill near Shipley and Cludders Rocks at Widdop, will be written this year. These are all interesting sites with spectacular views and a variety of different rocks. Baildon Hill also has a great industrial archaeological history which we are looking forward to investigating.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

We have planned lots of geological events for the summer which are detailed over the page.

WYGT activities aimed at children and young people are great fun and we have arranged four Geodays this summer, at Victoria Tower, Huddersfield, at Oakwell Hall, Kirklees, at Anglers Countryside Centre, near Wakefield and at the National Trust Marsden Moor Office. Do offer to help if you would like to or just bring a young person.

WYGT keeps records of 74 Local Geological Sites throughout the county. These sites are important for some aspect of geology, perhaps fossils or particularly well-shown rocks or structures, or good landscape features. The guided walks organised by WYGT are planned to show off the best LGS and there are also brief leaflets on the WYGT website which you can download. These tell you more about safe and accessible places to visit, though take care near rock faces and on slopes if you are out on your own.

Some of these sites are listed under a website called Earthcache. This lists interesting places to visit, usually beautiful or dramatic sites in the Yorkshire countryside. The website is at http://rock.geosociety.org/earthcache/

To find Yorkshire's sites, go to Advanced Search, then to United Kingdom, then Yorkshire and Humberside. You will find a list of earthcache sites, many of which have some geological information , including four which are West Yorkshire Local Geological Sites.

There are dramatic sandstone crags, views of the Aire Valley, fossil finds, including the longest tree fossil that we have ever seen and lots about the industrial heritage of the Baildon area.
